### 2024-2025 Annual Review



Evanston Symphony Orchestra's 2024-25 concert series was themed Soul & Inspiration. We delivered on these themes through diverse performances rooted in jazz, soul, opera, ballet-suite, and inspired

by African-American art. All this was in addition to our core classical focus. No matter what the genre... the music was *Inspirational!* 



Our season began with ESO's annual Lakeside Pops Concert, a family favorite in a typically outdoor setting at Wilmette's Gillson Park. But our 2024 concert was anything but typical. The skies opened up on our concert date – and on the rain date as well – moving the performance indoors to Evanston Township High School. With the crowd relocated, ESO played a rousing pops program; everyone in attendance "moved and grooved" enthusiastically to the music. Our thanks to our audience for your flexibility. We're hoping Mother Nature will cooperate on August 19th – 2025's concert date.

Our four series concerts highlighted time-honored masterworks coupled with more modern compositions.

We again welcomed violinist Maya Anjali Buchanan, who had debuted with ESO two years ago. She wowed the audience with her



energy and skill on Korngold's Violin Concerto.

Among ESO's other repertoire: We rose to the challenge of Shostakovich's powerful 5<sup>th</sup> Symphony



and Tchaikovsky's Rococo Variations with virtuoso cello soloist Christine Lamprea. Joined by North Shore Choral Society and soloists Josefien Stoppelenburg and Evan Bravos, we performed the monumental Brahms' German Requiem and two exhilarating Mozart compositions. On a more modern note, the 2024-25 season highlighted magnificent works of Soulful & Inspiring composers Jessie Montgomery, George Gershwin, Aaron Copland, Claude Debussy, William Grant Still, and Maurice Ravel (his Piano Concerto in G Major featured rising soloist Ko-Eun Yi). The diversity was magnetic and energizing!

A very special, local pleasure was ESO's performance of *Motor City Dance Mix* composed by NU's Jonathan Bailey Holland. A vibrant musical collage created in homage to Holland's home city of Detroit, the work featured classical, hip-hop, jazz, and other musical genres. We were delighted that Dr. Holland was in attendance to hear it live on stage!



Not to be forgotten (or missed, when it next comes 'round on December 14, 2025) was ESO's sold-out annual Holiday Concert! With a host of local performing arts partners, ESO again presented a true extravaganza of family entertainment to launch the 2024 holiday season. North Shore Choral Society, Chicago Ballet Arts, Evanston Dance Ensemble, ESO's Gospel Choir, Evanston Children's Choir, and the Evanston Township High School Choir all took center stage to ring in the festivities! The 350+ performers were exuberant! The excitement was electric! The program was Soulful and Inspiring!

Last May, we presented yet another first: ESO & All That Jazz!, a concert featuring ESO's Music Director Lawrence

Eckerling and Principal Trumpet Don Cagen, in a fundraiser to support ESO's programming. Thanks to our enthusiastic audience who came out and enjoyed the vibes of live jazz and pop! 
#### **Community Outreach**

#### 2025-26 Season: The POWER of Music


